Inspection, testing, maintenance, repair, replacement, and upgrade projects to improve the indoor air quality in school facilities, including mechanical and non-mechanical heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems, filtering, purification, and other air cleaning, fans, control systems, and window and door repair and replacement.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Replacing a roof could be an allowable use, especially if the LEA can correlate to environmental health and the correlation to supporting student health needs. • Replacing sealed windows with ones that open. • Replacing old ventilation systems. • Further, inspection, testing, maintenance, repair, replacement, and upgrade projects to improve the indoor air quality in school facilities. • Updating mechanical and non-mechanical heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems, filtering, purification, and other air cleaning, fans, control systems to improve air quality. • Additions to existing structures in certain instances: the expectation is first to update, repurpose, renovate existing buildings to meet needs resulting from the pandemic. In instances where there is no space to do so, there may be examples where an addition would be allowable. This would require additional discussion/information with the department.
