

21st CCLC, LEAPs, and the Tennessee Learning Loss Remediation and Student Acceleration Act

Background

The purpose of this document is to illustrate the differences between three programs that provide students with out-of-school-time activities: the Tennessee Learning Loss Remediation and Student Acceleration Act, 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC), and the Lottery for Education: Afterschool Programs (LEAPs). On the following pages, you will find an overview of each program, a crosswalk, and information about how funding for each program may be utilized to provide students with out-of-school-time programming, including summer school. Overview

Tennessee Learning Loss Remediation and Student Acceleration Act

In 2021, the Tennessee General Assembly updated state law to ensure all students have the support they need to read and perform on grade level. Specifically, each local educational agency (LEA) shall participate in the learning loss remediation and student acceleration program by implementing and conducting after-school learning mini-camps, learning loss bridge camps, and summer learning camps for students¹.

The 21st CCLC program provides federal funding to establish or expand community learning centers. These centers provide students with opportunities for academic enrichment, youth development, and family support during non-school hours or during periods when school is not in session. Originally funded by direct grants from the U.S. Department of Education (ED), responsibility for the administration of this program was transferred to state education agencies under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (formerly No Child Left Behind Act of 2001). Current guidelines for the administration of the 21st CCLC grant can be found under Title IV, Part B of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)². 21st CCLC is a five-year competitive grant program.

Lottery for Education: Afterschool Programs

In November 2002, Tennesseans voted to create a state lottery. The General Assembly established that profits from the lottery be used for specific educational programs: college scholarships, early childhood programs, and afterschool programs. In accordance with state law, one hundred percent (100%) of monies constituting an unclaimed prize shall be deposited into an afterschool account to administer a system of competitive grants and technical assistance for eligible organizations providing afterschool educational programs within Tennessee. The Tennessee Department of Education (department) is responsible for implementing the competitive grant process and for oversight of these funds³. LEAPs is a three-year competitive grant program.

Supplement not Supplant

21st CCLC and LEAPs both have supplement not supplant provisions as follows:

- 21st CCLC All funds must supplement and not supplant **state**, **local**, **and other non-federal funds** that would otherwise be available and used for program expenditures.⁴
- LEAPs All funds must supplement and not supplant **nonlottery educational resources** for after-school educational programs and purposes.⁵

Based on the above supplement not supplant provisions, grantees may not utilize 21st CCLC or LEAPs funds to pay for programming required under the Tennessee Learning Loss Remediation and Student Acceleration Act. Examples of how 21st CCLC and LEAPs funds can supplement required summer programming can be found in later sections of the document.
